Effective Youth Development (EYD) – Fiscal Year 2009. *DC Children and Youth Investment Trust Corporation (the Trust)* announces funds to provide targeted interventions to youth ages 14-21 in the District of Columbia. The Foundation seeks to support the delivery of services that are grounded in the principles of positive youth development that will lead to improved life outcomes for the District's youth. New IRS 403(b) Requirements. *Mike Sorrells from Cherry, Bekaert, & Holland, L.L.P* provides a brief overview of the preparations needed to meet the new IRS 403 (b) requirements. The new IRS reporting and compliance regulations for 403(b) retirement plans will take effect on January 1, 2009. Most tax exempt employers and

employees are aware that the 403(b) plan offers a significant vehicle for retirement savings. Unlike the 401(k) plan commonly used in the for-profit environment, 403(b) arrangements have never been regulated or subject to the same level of scrutiny by the government. However, this will soon change. For plan years beginning on or after January 1, 2009, 403(b) plans that are subject to ERISA will need to comply with the same annual reporting requirements as other tax advantaged (qualified) plans.
